The creation of the Binnaway Action Plan began during an extended period of drought with the recognition of a greater need to work together as a community. In 2020, Building our Warrumbungle Communities group was formed. After several Covid related delays, a series of events were held in May 2021 in every town across the Warrumbungle Shire, resulting in the development of Action Plans for each community in the Shire.

Facilitation of the community engagement process, community public events and preparation for the plan was undertaken by Peter Kenyon from the Bank of I.D.E.A.S, assisted by a group of passionate drivers who made up the Building Our Warrumbungle Communities team. More than 560 people took the opportunity to attend the 18 community gatherings across the Shire, to share ideas and collaborate, bringing together their passions and visions for the future of each community. Having identified our wealth of assets - people, physical environment, institutions, cultural, economic and social networks - we considered what we needed to retain, regain, change or create.

Based on the richness of our community's history of working together for the betterment of all, the Binnaway Action Plan focuses on our future. It will provide a map for short term projects, detailing goals to pursue and ideas to nurture and grow. It lays the groundwork to utilise funding and volunteer manpower, to augment and commence many community projects. Our objective is to create a prosperous and attractive locality for everyone to enjoy, and to foster our vision of an affordable, safe and family-friendly community in the heart of the Warrumbungles, that attracts new residents, visitors and business opportunities.



The name Binnaway is thought to derive from an Aboriginal term which means peppermint tree. Binnaway is home to the Kamilaroi Aboriginal people. Descendants of the traditional people of the Kamilaroi nation continue to be part an important part of Binnaway's community.

The present town of Binnaway forms part of the old 16,000 acre Mowabla lease run, first occupied in 1848, by William Lawson. The first settler was Charles Naseby in 1869. A plan for the town was laid out in 1876, with the village boundary being proclaimed on June 10th, 1908.

The first train came to Binnaway on the 2nd April, 1917 when the population of Binnaway was around 200, and by 1933 the population had increased to 861. In the following years Binnaway became an important rail junction and grain receival area, with the two large silos being built to store the many acres of wheat grown. The historic Railway Barracks and the recently constructed outdoor Railway Museum are a testament to the history of rail in this town.

What a sporty bunch the first pioneers were! Cricket was being played since 1895, Polo in the early 1900's, Horse Racing in 1904, Football in 1910, The Rifle Club in 1911, Tennis in 1912 and the Binnaway Bowling Club which opened in 1955. Many of these clubs are still a part of Binnaway today. The Golf Club is now also a well-attended venue as is the upgraded showground for a thriving agricultural show and highly sought after equine events.

These sporting groups continue to welcome new members with open arms.

Binnaway's claims to fame include: Frank Bourke's White Rose Orchestra, "The Shiralee", and Jack Renshaw.

Binnaway remains a lively town with small but committed groups working hard for the community and visitors alike to keep services going and create future projects like silo art, sport, festivals and more. The town is known for its friendliness and open hearted welcome to all.


