Funding for this project came from the Federal Drought Community Extension Programme to the Warrumbungle Shire Council for drought affected local government areas.

The community worked with the guidance of Peter to create the Mendooran Action Plan.

With the vision of Mendooran as "A vibrant, safe and family friendly community, working together for the future of our people and lands", assets were mapped, challenges, goals and actions identified.

This plan will provide the basis for a five year plan for the years ahead, assisting in achieving funding which will enable projects for the Mendooran community to prosper into the future.

Our Story



Mendooran is the oldest town on the Castlereagh River and is situated in the Warrumbungle Shire in the Central West of New South Wales. Mendooran lies midway between Dubbo and Coonabarabran and between Dunedoo and Gilgandra on the Castlereagh Highway. Mendooran is on the doorstep of the Goonoo State Conservation Area.

The explorer, John Oxley, came through the area in 1818 finding excellent grazing land, rolling hills, sheltered areas and good access to water, all of which are very conducive to the breeding of stock. The area was settled in 1834 and in 1852 Mendooran was gazetted as a town. In 1856, the surveyor G B White laid out the town plan with the spelling of Mendooran, however the local spelling of Mundooran remained in place for 62 years until the railway was surveyed and in 1918 the spelling was changed to the present version - Mendooran.

Sleeper cutting in the early days provided employment up until the 1990s. Present day employment is predominantly agriculture including cropping, sheep, cattle, beekeeping and allied industries.

Mendooran has a rich history of horse racing with the first race meeting being held in 1856. In 1972, Mendooran ran the first metric race in Australia, upstaging the premier tracks of Randwick, Flemington and others at the time.

Many buildings in the main street favour the art deco design with the Mechanics Institute Hall a splendid example of the Inter War Spanish Mission design. Built in 1935 with the assistance of the local people, the hall has been the hub for many functions including making camouflage nets for the war effort. Other buildings portray the early heritage style of the town and need to be preserved for the future generations and in keeping with Mendooran being "The Oldest Town on the Castlereagh".

AB Paterson's poem "The Travelling Post Office" mentions Mendooran:-

"The sheep are travelling for the grass, and travelling very slow;

They may be at Mundooran now, or past the Overflow,

Or tramping down the black-soil flats across by Waddiwong:"

There is anecdotal evidence that Paterson wrote "A Bush Christening" whilst in Mundooran in the late 1800s.

In recent times, boutique industries have become established including the Blackgate Distillery, Blue Sky Cheese and Dill Tickle.

- Environmental challenges eg. Drought, mouse plague, floods, fire and locusts





- Audit and plan to seal unsealed roads around town
- Council promote sale of unowned and use of vacant land attract families to buy
- Explore potential Council incentives to attract families to settle

2. Improve Swimming Pool Access and Utilisation

- Investigate ways to improve access to and utilisation of Swimming Pool eg. ways for travellers and visitors to utilise
- Extend the swimming season, investigate swimming pool blanket for potential to start earlier and finish later
