


OVERVIEW OUR 2022/23 IMPACT REPORT



Personally I am, and collectively we in Wagin are getting so much out of the


Community Builders Program. I see everything differently now – in my own town as well as in other rural towns.

Kaye's counselling journey

Kaye Wicker's story is a deeply personal one, resonating with many rural farming families we assist. Facing financial struggles after her brother's unexpected passing, Kaye returned to the family farm, overwhelmed by grief and the burden of making life-altering decisions. She sought help from Rural Aid's mental health team, which provided crucial support in managing her fear, anger, and maintaining not only the farm but also her own well-being. Her access to free counselling, made accessible through Rural Aid, has proven invaluable on this challenging journey.
