

Foreword



William Creek is a town with few permanent town residents yet it stands as the absolute heart of a community stretching hundreds of kilometres in all directions. Situated at the halfway point between Marree and Oodnadatta on the Oodnadatta Track in South Australia's far north, William Creek's exceptional surrounding natural landscapes, unrivalled sunsets, rich history and a quirky pub, makes it quintessentially unique.

From the original inhabitants, the Arabana people, to the first settlers, to its now current local community including surrounding cattle stations, William Creek has seen many people come and go over the years with different people and families adding their mark. In enhancing what the town already has, we want to ensure we maintain and strengthen the current heritage of the area while working with new demographics, technologies and opportunities.

This Community Development Action Plan has provided the William Creek community a fantastic foundation to work together to discover exactly what it is we care about as a group, a vital step to initiate change and growth.

As tourism in the area continues to grow rapidly, we want our town to be a highlight on the map and not merely a mark as people pass through on their way elsewhere. When tourists are stuck for a few days due to road closures with rain, or if locals have a meeting and the kids

get dragged along as they so often do, we want everyone to be excited about spending more time in the town because of the place we have made it. We hope to have facilities and infrastructure that grows our social connectedness and cohesiveness, and makes us a community that people talk about and are eager to return to.

Completing projects in such a remote location attracts numerous additional logistical hurdles. Getting tradespeople and supplies is costly. Currently, much of what the community achieves is through volunteering our own time, equipment and machinery and all things in between. Our community has shown we are very competently able to deliver and complete projects that many large communities would struggle to do, yet this often comes at a cost to a small group of volunteers and community members.

We are incredibly grateful to Rural Aid for supporting this Plan and to the inimitable Peter Kenyon for sharing his knowledge, enthusiasm and passion whilst guiding us through its formulation. We are a community that is poor in numbers yet rich in enthusiasm, optimism and achievement who have the tenacity and resourcefulness to make great things happen. We hope that others see our vision and the potential of what William Creek can become, and willingly contribute in making our visions a reality, rather than a wish.

Our Story

William Creek is uniquely placed in the heart of South Australia's outback on the Oodnadatta Track. Situated 880 kilometres north of Adelaide, the town is one of Australia's most remote and least populated towns located midway between the communities of Marree and Oodnadatta, surrounded by Anna Creek Station.

William Creek leads to numerous iconic natural landmarks including Kati Thanda (Lake Eyre), Dalhousie and Coward Springs, the Painted Hills and Simpson Desert, and serves as a crossroad between Coober Pedy, Oodnadatta/Marla and Marree/Roxby Downs.

The town holds a rich history tied to both European settlers and the traditional Arabana people. Founded in the late 19th century as a stop on the Great Northern Railway (the Ghan), William Creek played a key role in connecting Australia's southern and northern regions.

The town continues to embody the spirit of the Outback, with its heritage buildings, notably the William Creek Hotel built in 1887, offering travellers an authentic Australian experience where you never know who you're going to meet or what stories you might hear. Despite its tiny population, the William Creek township provides a hub for the local and

surrounding community and outback tourism.

The William Creek community has a busy calendar each year hosting numerous events including: an Australia Day family fun celebration; a Gymkhana/Motokhana weekend in March; an Anzac Day dawn service; a weekend of Bronco Branding, Campdrafting and Cricket in August; and the "Outback Fly-in" in September, attracting many plane enthusiasts.

Community members of the area are proactive, enthusiastic and constantly looking for opportunities to build the liveability, economic sustainability and appeal of the community. Strong community drive and commitment is evident with the recent installation of Australia's first state-of-the-art Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS) Virtual Emergency Centre which was achieved by the community working together with numerous stakeholders.

Though pastoral operations, especially cattle grazing, remain crucial to the town's economy, William Creek's tourism sector offers significant potential for growth. The town's future lies in balancing its cultural and historic identity and rugged charm with modern, sustainable growth, making it a welcoming and unique destination for local residents, pastoral families, workers and tourists.

The statement below is our intended outcome:


A welcoming, proactive and future-focused outback community that preserves our unique heritage and culture while building on strong community connections

Our Challenges

Like many small inland rural communities, our community needs to respond creatively to a series of demographic, social, economic and environmental challenges. These issues include:

- Condition of the roads and accessibility
- Financial cost to implement new ideas (high freight costs, high 'call-outs' for tradespeople)
- Small population
- Access to the services and tradespeople
- Limited children and youth facilities
- Native Title decisions
- Access to Kati Thanda (Lake Eyre)
- Delay between idea and delivery
- Being forgotten and not understood by city counterparts
- Red tape e.g. insurance costs to run events
- Seasonal limitations due to long summers and limited tourism season
- Limited visitor infrastructure and attraction
- Limited marketing of community assets and appeal
- Demand on local volunteers and businesses due to lack of services
- Limited volunteer numbers
- Volunteer fatigue
- Perception of town as a 'Drive Through' location, not a 'Destination'







Enhancing Key Infrastructure

ACTIONS

 Advocate to the Outback Communities Authority and relevant stakeholders to improve access between the airstrip and the Royal Flying Doctor Service.

Timeframe: Immediate

2. Advocate to the Outback Communities Authority on the potential for **an upgrade to the airstrip.**

Timeframe: Immediate

3. Advocate to Outback Communities Authority on the potential for improved telecommunications access and performance in the township.

Timeframe: Ongoing

4. Advocate to Outback Communities Authority and Tourism SA on the potential for upgraded **signage on the Oodnadatta Track** to educate tourists.

Timeframe: Medium term

5. Explore construction of a **BBQ** and shaded seating area.

Theme Two

Development of Local Tourism Potential

ACTIONS



- 1. Develop a William Creek Tourism Strategy through the formation of a Tourism Strategy Task Team within the WCPA that:
 - a. Audits current tourism attractions, facilities, events, trails and initiatives.
 - b. Reviews regional tourism links, activities and trails.
 - c. Identifies opportunities to enhance existing products and branding, including promotion as a destination and not just a drive through.
 - d. Identifies opportunities to create new tourism products, especially cultural tourism, aviation tourism and building upon the strong local heritage assets such as the Old Ghan infrastructure and our dark skies.
 - e. Recommends ways to enhance marketing, customer service, community storytelling and operator networking.

Timeframe: Immediate to Medium Term and Ongoing

- 2. Undertake Town Beautification through a Town Beautification Task Team within the WCPA that:
 - a. Undertakes an audit of existing street and local areas to assess presentation including interpretative signage.
 - b. Seeks further ideas and suggestions from William Creek residents and businesses.
 - c. Creates prioritised beautification areas such as around the RFDS building, shaded areas, seating and increase number of trees and lawn.
 - d. Seeks support/implements opportunities.
 - e. Participates in the 'Sustainable Communities Program' of KESAB.

Timeframe: Immediate and Ongoing

3. Identify, design, construct and promote local 'William Creek selfie' locations including quirky signs and a sunset viewing platform.

Timeframe: Short Term

4. Instigate creation and installation of 'Up Ahead Signs' to promote relevant dates of regular activities, features, and points of interest for people approaching town to encourage them to stop.

Timeframe: Short term

5. Advocate for the installation of a local Information Bay, integrating interactive and technology activated links (QR codes) providing relevant information about the area.

Timeframe: Short Term and Ongoing

6. Design and implement an 'Interpretive Walking Trail' of the town with a mud map so visitors can learn about events (i.e. gymkhana) regardless of when they visit.

Timeframe: Medium Term

Theme Three

Child & Sporting Facility Development Opportunities

ACTIONS

1. Develop a Task Team of WCPA to undertake an audit of existing child/ youth facilities to determine the need and capacity to build, renew, upgrade and/or modify existing facilities such as a playground, tennis court and golf course.

Timeframe: Short Term

2. Explore and secure funding to build a Rage Cage multi-sport facility, Mini-Golf and multi-use play facility in William Creek.

Timeframe: Short Term and Ongoing

3. Explore and secure funding to improve current community and social facilities and infrastructure in William Creek.

Timeframe: Short Term and Ongoing

4. Continue to foster family-friendly community social occasions.

Timeframe: Immediate and Ongoing

5. Continue to organise and facilitate learning opportunities and workshops for local children.

Timeframe - Ongoing
