

Foreword



Paterson is one of the Hunter Valley's oldest villages, nestled between two ranges that meet on the Paterson River. The river, road, and railway all converge in this small space, landlocked by steep ranges and the floodplain, creating a unique village renowned for its historic buildings and charming streetscapes. Views from the village showcase either the misty adjacent ranges or the fertile, expansive river lands, creating a sense of place unlike any other village.

The hinterland of Paterson encompasses commercial farms and many lifestyle properties, with the large Tocal estate—now an agricultural college—being a prominent part of Paterson's history since European settlement.

"Tocal" is an Aboriginal word from the local dialect meaning "large," "big," or "plenty," which is believed to reflect the bountiful nature of the natural environment. The river was known as Yimmang by the local Aboriginal people.

Paterson serves as the gateway to the Paterson Valley, which comprises the ancestral lands of the Wonnarua, Gringai and Worimi Aboriginal Peoples. The village was established at the head of navigation of the Paterson River and served as the centre of business for the valley community for decades, until the railway displaced the riverboat for transport.

History tells us that the Paterson community has always stood up for itself and worked collectively toward a better future. The opportunity afforded by Rural Aid was enthusiastically grasped to enable the community to take the next step as our nation's economy develops.

The community is very grateful for the enthusiastic leadership of Peter Kenyon OAM, supported by Steph Walsh and Rural Aid. Peter's curation of the process has brought the community together in a way otherwise not possible.

Much has already been achieved, and this Community Action Plan provides a pathway to the future. Community action requires community-wide support, and the process that Rural Aid has so generously funded has built that foundation for the Paterson community.

Our Story

Paterson is a lively, historic and picturesque village in Dungog Shire, Hunter Region of New South Wales. Well-known for its colonial heritage, agricultural traditions and strong sense of community, this charming settlement sits on the banks of the Paterson River within the Paterson Valley. Local historian, Cameron Archer coined the phrase "The Magic Valley" to describe this Valley for the way it has constantly provided for its inhabitants, based on Norman Lindsay's imagery of the "The Magic Pudding".

The village pf Paterson has played a pivotal role in the Hunter Region's development, from its early days as a trading and farming hub to its present-day status as an attractive country destination for visitors and those seeking a rural lifestyle.

Indigenous peoples lived in the Paterson Valley for thousands of years before European arrival. Another local historian Dr Brian Walsh captures this enduring connection: "Their history is one of relentless change. It is a dynamic history marked by continuous and at times dramatic changes in climate, sea level, landscape, population, social organisation, groupings, territories, lifestyle, diet and use of tools."

European exploration began in 1801 when Lieutenant-Colonel William Paterson led the first expedition up the river that would bear his name. By 1804, convict gangs were cutting cedar logs in the district and floating them downstream. Permanent European settlement commenced along the Paterson River from 1812, with the 1820s seeing settlers granted or sold land throughout the valley.

As Brian Walsh notes, this expansion "caused large-scale dispossession of Aboriginal people from their land and widespread colonisation of the Valley." The growing areas devoted to cattle, sheep and cropping steadily reduced the spaces available to local Indigenous

people to maintain their traditional way of life.

Settlement of the valley proceeded rapidly, with Paterson emerging as the regional centre due to its position at the head of navigation on the tidal Paterson River. The railway's arrival in 1911 marked another milestone, connecting the town to broader markets while gradually displacing the river trade that had sustained it.

Today, Paterson retains its historic character through well-preserved nineteenth-century buildings, including the Court House, Post Office, hotels, churches and heritage homes. The town's welcoming pubs, cafes and shops create a vibrant social heart, while community events like the Tocal Field Days, Paterson Historical Society's Annual Historic Walk, Tocal's Homestead's "Peek into the Past" event and Tucker Park activities, from Paterson Rotary's Cracker Night to local markets, bring residents together.

Paterson people stand up for their town, it's part of their character, and newcomers quickly embrace this spirit. Over the past decade, residents have mounted a determined campaign against the prospect of hundreds of heavy quarry trucks rumbling through their village from dawn to dusk. Through public protests, media campaigns, and representatives speaking at public hearings and in the NSW Land and Environment Court, the community has consistently opposed expansion of the nearby Martins Creek Quarry.

This ongoing fight, now strengthened by this Community Action Plan, has deepened Paterson's sense of purpose and determination to preserve what makes it such a wonderful place to call home.

Our Vision

A Vision Statement is a vivid description of what our community aspires to become, without its current barriers, but tied to what we value as a community.

The statement below is our intended outcome:

A vibrant, safe and welcoming community where our heritage, village charm, rural enterprises and lifestyle opportunities proudly combine.














Theme One

ACTIONS

1. **Instigate a quarterly Forum of Paterson Community Groups** that come together to collaboratively discuss, share, plan and implement actions to advance the village of Paterson and help achieve its vision and goals.

Timeframe: Immediate and Ongoing

2. **Instigate a calendar of low-cost family events that connect residents and build community relationships** e.g. community fun days, cracker and bonfire night, community talent event, family fun day/picnic, micro street parties, Christmas market, crop swaps, community swap meets etc.

Timeframe: Immediate and Ongoing

- 3. Continually promote **volunteering & community engagement** through:
 - Continual invitation to community members to voice ideas, suggestions and actively volunteer
 - Recognition and celebration of community volunteers through media exposure and an annual 'Volunteer Appreciation Event'
 - Seeking support from the NSW Centre for Volunteering and utilisation of their resources, programs and training
 - Nomination of local volunteers for the annual NSW Volunteer of the Year Awards
 - Continual promotion of the importance of local emergency services and their dependence on local volunteers

4. Advocate for the annual allocation of a **Community Development Grant** for each of the townships in the Dungog Shire Council. This would enable each community, through an annual **Community Forum**, to determine their community development priorities in utilising the funding

Timeframe: Immediate and Ongoing

5. Continue to participate and contribute to the **Twin Rivers Community Hub** (website: www.twinrivers.au) which seeks to provide a local community website that creates space for the residents of Paterson, Vacy and Gresford to connect, communicate and create.

Timeframe: Ongoing

6. Participate in the Dungog Shire-wide initiative to create a **Community Foundation** that pools donations into a coordinated investment and grant-making facility dedicated primarily to supporting future social and economic development of the communities. Create a **Paterson Sub-Fund** of the Foundation.

Timeframe: Immediate and Ongoing

7. Participate in the **Platypus Trail Project** being developed by Upper Hunter Community Builders Teams as one initiative to link communities physically and organisationally. Such an initiative seeks to create opportunities for eco-tourism, education, environment protection and Indigenous inclusion.

9. Create **community gardens** in one or more locations in Paterson to grow and consume fresh produce, improve community connection, increase mental wellbeing, and decrease loneliness.

1. Form a Youth Development Task Team (including Paterson young people) to research, design and implement more **youth programs targeting the 13-17 age group.**

Timeframe: Immediate and Ongoing

2. Maintain **regular contact with young people after they leave the community** via social media, regular newsletter and organisation of a calendar of school and sporting reunions.

Timeframe: Short-Term and Ongoing

3. **Identify and support progressive young leaders** by linking them to regional, state and national leadership development experiences.

Timeframe: Immediate and Ongoing

4. Encourage **Rotary Club of Paterson** to facilitate key Rotary youth initiatives, namely Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN), Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) and other youth leadership opportunities to benefit more local young people in their personal and leadership development.
