We acknowledge we have much to learn from their long connection to this land.


We would also like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the sacrifices made by this district especially during the World War I period when 360 local men signed up to serve in the armed forces. For a relatively small

population this was a huge commitment, taking a large percentage of the local young men, and of course not all returned.

Rather than simply preserving what we have, we are seizing a rare opportunity to shape what comes next. Guided by Peter Kenyon from Bank of I.D.E.A.S. and Steph Walsh from Rural Aid, the Dungog Community Action Plan brings together the ideas, energy, and aspirations of locals from all walks of life, gathered through hands-on workshops and genuine, grassroots conversations.

We honour the legacy of those who came before us and we are also looking forward with a shared determination to grow social connection, boost well-being, and build a future filled with hope. This plan is about progress and pride, and it is especially about making space for young people, ensuring they have a voice, a role, and a real stake in shaping what is to come. While we are a small and often under-resourced community, we know that by working hand in hand with trust, collaboration, and a shared sense of purpose, we can unlock new opportunities. Together, we can strengthen infrastructure and achieve great things for the future of Dungog Shire.

Our Story



Dungog is a charming and historically significant town located in the Hunter Region of New South Wales. Surrounded by rolling hills, lush farmland, and the pristine Williams River, Dungog is known for its vibrant community, strong rural traditions and deep cultural roots. With a history tied to timber, dairy farming, and the railway, Dungog has evolved into a welcoming town that embraces both its heritage and new opportunities for growth.

European settlement began in the early 19th century, with the first land grants issued in 1823. The town grew steadily, and by 1838, it was officially surveyed. The arrival of the North Coast Railway in 1911 played a crucial role in boosting trade and industry, particularly timber and dairy farming, which became the backbone of the local economy.

Today, Dungog maintains its strong sense of community through local events, festivals, and active volunteer groups. The town is also well-known for its many events that celebrate local arts, music, film, and heritage. The Dungog Agricultural Show, established in 1896, showcases the area's strong agricultural heritage. The historic streetscape, featuring well-preserved heritage buildings such as the

James Theatre (Australia's oldest purposebuilt cinema still in operation), adds to the town's character. In recent years, new businesses, cafes, and creative industries have brought fresh energy to the local economy.

Surrounded by stunning natural landscapes, Dungog is a gateway to outdoor adventure. Barrington Tops National Park, a UNESCO World Heritage-listed area, and State Forests are a major outdoor recreation drawcard. Other local walking and riding trails provide further opportunities for residents and visitors to enjoy the region's natural beauty. The Dungog Common, on the outskirts of town, provides access to 650 acres of bushland, walking and riding trails, and picnic spots.

Looking ahead, Dungog's community development priorities focus on preserving its heritage, supporting sustainable agriculture and tourism, and strengthening local businesses. The town is keen to foster innovation while maintaining the close-knit, welcoming atmosphere that has made it such a special place for generations. Through collaboration and forward-thinking initiatives, Dungog is poised to continue thriving as an attractive, resilient and dynamic community.

Our Vision

A Vision Statement is a vivid description of what our community aspires to become, without its current barriers, but tied to what we value as a community.

Dungog is a caring, safe and enterprising community.

We work together to create new opportunities for everyone to enjoy, with deep respect for our heritage and natural environment.

- 9. To provide support for our senior citizens and persons with disabilities to enable them to continue to enjoy the benefits of our community.

Like many small inland rural communities, our community needs to respond creatively to a series of demographic, social, economic and environmental challenges. These issues include:

- Young people needing to travel out of Dungog for Recreation Centre-style activities.
- Limited after school youth activities.
- Limited non-sporting youth activities.
- Lack of rental accommodation and affordable accommodation.
- Cost of living challenges.
- Poor business collaboration.
- Irregular, short shop hours.
- Access to skilled labour and competition with mining salaries.
- Poor signage.
- Limited resources in tourism marketing and development.
- Lack of mainstreet vibrancy on weekends.
- Limited evening dining out options.
- Limited opening hours at the Pool.
- Poor connectivity.
- Flood prone nature of the town.
- Poor condition of district roads.
- Limited public transport options.
- Lack of knowledge of First Nation history.
- Limited train timetable.
- Council attitudes and red tape.

Theme One

Building a More Connected Community

ACTIONS

- 1. Instigate a **calendar of events that connects residents and builds community relationship**s e.g. Family Fun Day, Good Neighbour Day, street parties, Christmas event in mainstreet etc.
- 2. Form a Welcome to Dungog Task Team who develop and distribute a **'Welcome Kit'** and coordinate **'Welcome to Dungog' events.**
- 3. Implement a **community asset mapping initiative** that discovers, records and connects the gifts, skills and passions of residents. This tool is utilised to enhance local volunteerism.
- 4. Work with other communities in the Dungog Shire Council region to create a regional **Community Foundation** that pools donations into a coordinated investment and grant-making facility dedicated primarily to supporting future social and economic development of the communities. Create a **Dungog Sub-Fund** as part of the process.

- 5. Promote the introduction of pickleball in Dungog.
- 6. Advocate and support the Dungog Shire Council on priority recreational facility projects, including:
 - Creation of an all-ages recreation centre
 - Creation of a dog park
 - Continuous upgrade of the Showgrounds
- 7. Advocate to the Dungog Shire Council for **improvements to the pool**

- 3. Instigate conversations with the **Rotary Club of Dungog** about greater use of three key Rotary youth initiatives, namely Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN) and Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) to benefit more Dungog youth people in their personal and leadership development.
- 4. Initiate conversations with the three Dungog schools about the use of the **RuMAD? Program (BOI)** as a tool to encourage students to design and implement community building programs based on what they care about.
- 5. Form a Task Team to establish a social media tool for retaining contact with young people who have moved away and continually reminding them of opportunities in their hometown.
- 6. Advocate for the establishment of a **TAFE Connect Centre** in Dungog to provide vocational training opportunities locally.
- 7. Form a task team to design and implement a calendar of **school holiday activities** for Dungog children and young people.

 - Share impressions and suggestions with DSC and Dungog community

- 4. Advocate for the reduction of the speed limit in the mainstreet and initiatives that foster street life.

- 1. Advocate to NPWS and Dungog Shire Council for **improved public** access to Barrington Tops, especially in support of the proposed multi-day walking trail recommended in Theme 2 above.
- 2. Develop **new tourism marketing tools**, namely:
 - 'Here are our Top Ten Attractions' flyer
 - Tour itineraries to target car, bike and caravan clubs with 2- & 3-day itineraries with places to see and visit, including the Horseshoe Drive. Include these in the Welcome Kit.
 - A collective brochure summarising the local resources for making Dungog the perfect wedding destination.
- 3. Continue the promotion of Dungog's outdoor recreation assets including the Dungog Common, mountain bike trails, walking trails and Sculpture on the Farm.
- 4. Activate a festival of individual events spanning the month of September. This will be kicked off with Sculpture on the Farm and then showcase events like Vacy Village Festival, Dungog Tea Party, Pedalfest, Ride Dungog, Run Dungog, Walk Dungog, CWA Quilt Show and speaker series.
- 5. Advocate and promote to gain interest and support for the introduction of **new tourism possibilities in Dungog**, namely:
 - Link to the Paddock to Plate initiatives including long table dinners featuring visiting chefs
 - New events related to bicycle tourism and walking, including events at the Dungog Common
 - Local Aboriginal culture and heritage information, exhibits and experiences
 - Evening events on Dowling Street
- 6. Advocate for an improvement in train and bus timetables & services.
